Youth Thrive: What is it? How is the New York City Probation Department using it to transform work with youth?

Research conducted by The Center for the Study of Social Policy has identified a set of key competencies that have been shown to help young people increase protective and promotive factors while reducing risk factors. Research shows that these supports help young people move beyond trauma and the impact of poorly resourced environments to become more resilient in addressing their developmental needs. The New York City Probation Department, Juvenile Division, as one of the six Youth Thrive Learning Communities, is leading the way in implementing the protective and promotive factors in their work with youth and families involved with the juvenile justice system. Since implementing Youth Thrive in 2016 the Youth Thrive framework has guided case planning and staff development.
